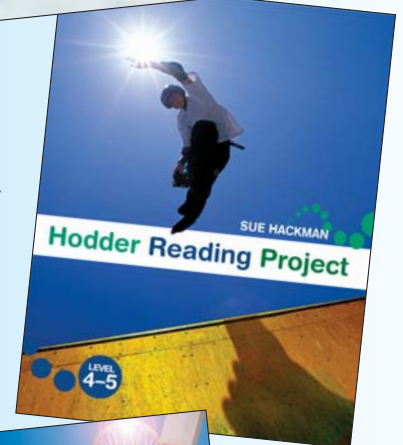
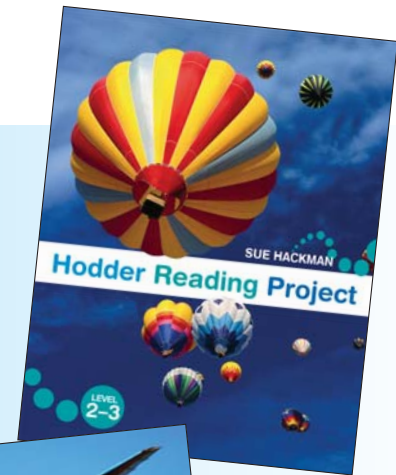

How Hodder Reading Project works

The **Hodder Reading Project** – a suite of resources designed to break through barriers to reading progression.

Written for pupils working at Levels 2–3, 3–4, 4–5 and 5–6, the scheme consists of a five-step approach from pupil evaluation and target setting through to new skill application and consolidation. This gives pupils all the support they need to progress through the scheme at their own pace.

It comprises a Pupil's Book, Teacher's Resource and a set of real Reading Books at each level. At Level 5–6 the **Hodder Reading Project** consists of a Teacher's Resource and a set of 6 Reading Books.

- 1 *Informal reading tests are used to evaluate pupils' reading needs.*



- 2 *Pupils' reading targets are set.*



- 5 *Pupils are retested to check progress.*



- 4 *The pupils apply their new skills in reading groups, using the reading books.*

- 3 *The teacher leads the pupils through the textbook.*

Level 2–3 provides an accelerated route for lower-attainers to catch up with their peers in reading. It offers support to those pupils whose reading levels are significantly below the national average. The 12 Reading Books cover a wide variety of topics and help to build confidence without being patronising.



Level 3–4 offers further support to pupils whose reading levels are below the national average and can be used as a starting point or to strengthen the skills developed at Level 2–3. The 6 Reading Books present a step up in both length and complexity.



Level 4–5 ensures that pupils are reading confidently at Level 5 by the end of the course. This stage is principally about developing responsive readers into active readers, then critical readers. The accompanying 6 Reading Books promote these skills.



Level 5–6 develops the reading skills of confident, active readers through engagement with a range of 6 fiction and non-fiction Reading Books.

Hodder Reading Project: Levels 3 → 4

Sequels, series and serials

- **sequel** – a follow-up book which shows what happened after the story finished, and sets off on a new adventure
- **series** – a set of books about the same people, but each one has a brand-new story and can stand alone
- **serial** – a story released in parts, and each section follows on from the last

For example:

CSI: Crime Scene Investigation is a series.
Eastenders is a serial.

Activity

- Name examples of sequels, series and serials in books, TV and film.

Dramatisations

Famous books are often adapted for television and film but watching the film of a book is not the same thing as reading the book. You get most of the plot, but you miss out on the language and the telling of the story.

- Discuss your experiences of 'films of the book'. What differences did you notice in the content and in the way you experienced the story?

Tarantula

Tarantulas are big hairy spiders that live in warm places such as jungles and deserts. They have large heads and jaws, and bodies that can spin silk like other spiders. They are hairy all over. They have 8 legs with 2 tiny claws at the end of each one. Each leg has 7 small moving parts. Tarantulas can grow to be the size of a big dinner plate.



Hunting

Tarantulas do not spin webs to catch their food like other spiders. They run to catch their food. They hunt at night. They have fangs and use them to grab small animals such as frogs and bugs, and even birds. They crush their prey with their jaws or they can inject venom that makes the flesh melt. They then suck it in. Sometimes they grind their food into a ball and cover it with silk to keep it for later. But no tarantula has ever killed a human being.

Did you know?

- There are 800 types of tarantula.
- They can be kept as pets.
- They can hiss.
- They have 8 eyes.
- They sleep for most of the day.
- They lay 500–1000 eggs once a year.
- They can live for over 30 years.
- They use their hairs to feel and smell.

What to do if a tarantula bites you


The bite will swell up and itch, then fade away. Clean the bite with soap and water. Pick out any small hairs, as these cause itching. Use a...

Before reading

- Discuss what you already know about Martin Luther King.
- Discuss what you already know about the history of black people in the United States of America.

Read pages 1 and 2 and look at the picture on page 3

- Find 2 things the picture tells you that the words do not.

Read up to page 9

- Work out what the following words mean by looking at their parts and the way they are used. Check in the dictionary afterwards.
 - ▶ Civil War (p.4)
 - ▶ Segregate (p.4)
 - ▶ Divinity (p.7)
- Find out where Alabama is and mark it on the map of the United States of America on Sheet 4.2. Use an atlas. Look in the index for Alabama.
- Discuss what you know about Gandhi. Do you know any other people who have fought against segregation?
